Guia: Dad will have a hard time defending Sayeed even if he downplays the evidence as nothing but circumstantial.

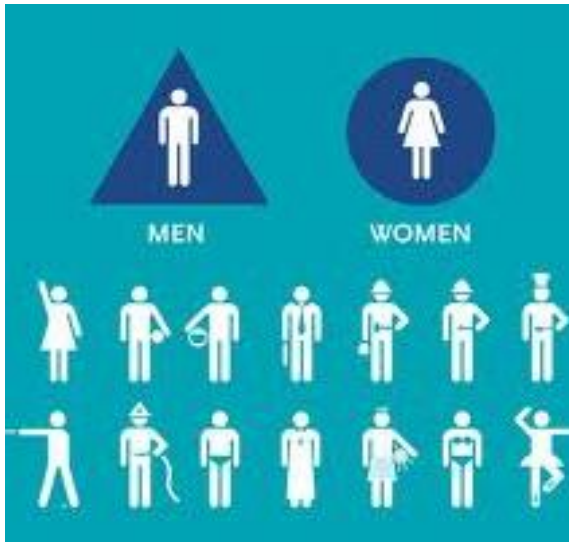
David : The recent events have stigmatized his race as people capable of cold-blooded murders.
